**1,530** students attended Central Catholic Schools, which is 23% of all students in Catholic schools in our Diocese.

**\$772,046** in tuition assistance was awarded in Parish and Central Catholic schools from Partners in Charity and the Forward in Faith endowment, which met 19% of the identified need. **817** students received financial assistance.

**602** catechists availed themselves of **9** different certification courses offered last year and 4 workshops.

19 new catechists received provisional certification, 8 achieved Basic certification and **6** received Master Catechist Certification.

# Dear Friends in Christ.

Numbers. They are an important part of the story when looking at a year in review, but they don't tell the whole story. That's because our story involves the faces and names of our brothers and sisters whose lives have been changed, whether in big ways or small ways, by making God's love manifest in the world. I am reduce our line of credit pleased that we are able to share some "snapshots" of those experiences on the cover of our report.

In my role as Bishop of the Diocese of Worcester, I must assure that we are being good stewards of the resources available to us to carry on our mission. Although overall diocesan operations were challenged and experienced a deficit of \$278,802 before unrealized gains on investments, it was a very positive year for investments with unrealized gains of \$1,395,687. As in years past, these figures do not include parish, private and parochial schools or non-diocesan Catholic agencies. Our independently audited financial statements for the year ended August 31, 2017 are availa-

ble online at worcesterdiocese.org.



Thanks to you, our supporters, Partners in Charity exceeded its \$5 million goal for the second year in a row, enabling us to fund agencies and ministries during the current fiscal year. Our "by the numbers" boxes give you a sense of the number of people who are impacted by these agencies and

ministries. I am grateful to our pastors, parish leadership and, of course, our donors who make this possible each year.

Other numbers do indicate the challenges we face. Priests' Retirement Care experienced a larger deficit than the previous year despite another successful Celebrate Priesthood event and significant funding from Partners in Charity. Although it will appear in next year's annual report, I want to thank donors who recently made legacy gifts for Priests' Retirement Care, particularly the McNamara Family in memory of their beloved uncle, Father Philip McNamara.

Seminarian education continues to be strong and we were blessed with a priest ordained last June. Catholic Schools are hold-

ing steady despite the unmet, demonstrated need for additional financial aid. Our system is under the leadership of a new superintendent who is focused on developing an

effective strategic plan to address reduced enrollment across the system.

While we managed to due to the DEF by almost \$3.9 million, our receivables balance due from parishes was essentially unchanged. This is an indicator of a bigger, more



systemic problem. Many parishes are struggling to develop balanced budgets due, in part, to capital needs and increased maintenance costs. We must plan for the future while we address our day-to-day operations. With input from various advisory boards, we have engaged Guidance in Giving, consultants in stewardship and development, to produce a feasibility study regarding a proposed capital campaign to benefit specific diocesan programs such as Priests Retirement Care, Catholic education and the financial needs of our 96 parishes. More information will be announced soon about this critical effort which has only taken place once in our diocesan history.

We do not operate as a diocese without help. Allow me to express my gratitude to God for the many clergy, vowed religious and laypeople who volunteer their expertise on our various advisory boards including the Diocesan Finance Committee, Diocesan Investment Committee, the Diocesan Expansion Fund Board of Governors, Partners in Charity Advisory Board, Diocesan School Board, St. Paul Catholic Schools Consortium, Adopt-a-Student Board and other advisory boards for our various ministries and agencies.

Finally, I thank God for you, our supporters, who exercise your role as stewards of the faith with which we have been endowed. May God bless you and your family in the year ahead.

12 men are preparing to be ordained permanent deacons; **94** deacons serve in our parishes and agencies and are supported by the Office of the Diaconate.

There were **32,600** opportunities to assist people in need with Emergency Services at Catholic Charities area offices: Leominster: **8,200**; Worcester: **15,500**; Southbridge: 4,400 and Milford/ Whitinsville: 4,500

335 people received Immigration Assistance and **56** Refugees were resettled in the area with Catholic Charities.

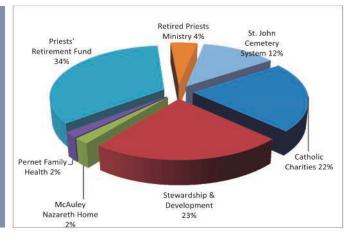

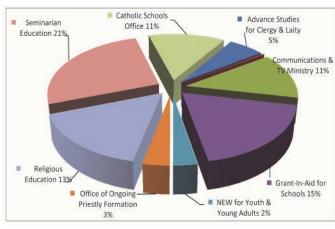


## 2017 CAMPAIGN REVIEW

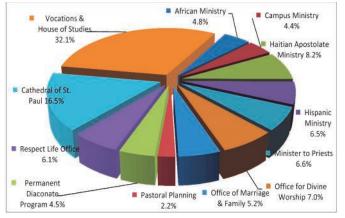
